RESOLUTION ACCEPTING THE DETERMINATION BY THE TOWN OF SCHOHARIE PLANNING BOARD TO ACT AS LEAD AGENCY FOR THE ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW OF THE AMERICAN RECYCLING MANAGEMENT, LLC PROJECT AND ACKNOWLEDGING RECEIPT OF THE NEGATIVE DECLARATION ISSUED WITH RESPECT THERETO.

WHEREAS, Schoharie County Industrial Development Agency (the "Agency") is authorized and empowered by the provisions of Chapter 1030 of the 1969 Laws of New York, constituting Title 1 of Article 18-A of the General Municipal Law, Chapter 24 of the Consolidated Laws of New York, as amended (the "Enabling Act") and Chapter 114 of the 1973 Laws of New York, as amended, constituting Section 905-a of said General Municipal Law (said Chapter and the Enabling Act being hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Act") to promote, develop, encourage and assist in the acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, improving, maintaining, equipping and furnishing of commercial facilities, among others, for the purpose of promoting, attracting and developing economically sound commerce and industry to advance the job opportunities, health, general prosperity and economic welfare of the people of the State of New York, to improve their prosperity and standard of living, and to prevent unemployment and economic deterioration; and

WHEREAS, to accomplish its stated purposes, the Agency is authorized and empowered under the Act to acquire, construct and install one or more "projects" (as defined in the Act) or to cause said projects to be acquired, constructed and installed, and to convey said projects or to lease said projects with the obligation to purchase; and

WHEREAS, in December, 2019, American Recycling Management, LLC, a New York limited liability company (the "Company"), has submitted an application (the "Application") to the Agency, a copy of which Application is on file at the office of the Agency, which Application requested that the Agency consider undertaking a project (the "Project") for the benefit of the Company, said Project consisting of the following: (A) (1) the acquisition of an interest in a parcel of real estate containing approximately 117 acres of land located at the corner of Rt. 7/30A and Zicha Road in the Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New York (the "Land"), (2) the construction on the Land of an approximately 20,000 square foot facility (the "Facility"), (3) the acquisition of various truck tractors and trailers (the "Trucks") and (4) the acquisition and installation thereon and therein of machinery and equipment (the "Equipment") (the Land, the Facility, the Trucks and the Equipment being hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Project Facility"), all of the foregoing to constitute a commercial trucking terminal/facility to be owned and operated by the Company for the transport of recycled material and any other directly and indirectly related activities; (B) the granting of certain "financial assistance" (within the meaning of Section 854(14) of the Act) with respect to the foregoing, including potential exemptions from certain sales and use taxes, real property taxes, real estate transfer taxes and mortgage recording taxes (collectively, the "Financial Assistance"); and (C) the lease (with an obligation to purchase) or sale of the Project Facility to the Company or such other person as may be designated by the Company and agreed upon by the Agency; and

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted by the members of the Agency on November 25, 2019 (the "Public Hearing Resolution"), the Agency authorized a public hearing to be held pursuant to Section 859-a of the Act with respect to the Project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authorization contained in the Public Hearing Resolution, the Chief Executive Officer of the Agency (A) caused notice of a public hearing of the Agency (the "Public Hearing") pursuant to Section 859-a of the Act, to hear all persons interested in the Project and the financial assistance being contemplated by the Agency with respect to the Project, to be mailed on December 5, 2019 to the chief executive officers of the county and of each city, town, village and school district in which the Project Facility is to be located, (B) caused notice of the Public Hearing to be posted on December 6, 2019 on a public bulletin board located in the Town of Schoharie Town Hall located at 300 Main Street in the Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New York and on the Agency's website on December 5, 2019; (C) caused notice of the Public Hearing to be published on December 4, 2019 in the Times-Journal, a newspaper of general circulation available to the residents of Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New York, (D) conducted the Public Hearing on December 16, 2019 at 7:00 o'clock p.m., local time in the Town Board Chambers of the Town Hall of the Town of Schoharie located at 300 Main Street in the Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New and (E) prepared a report of the Public Hearing (the "Public Hearing Report") fairly summarizing the views presented at such Public Hearing and caused copies of said Public Hearing Report to be made available to the members of the Agency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, Chapter 43-B of the Consolidated Laws of New York, as amended (the "SEQR Act") and the regulations (the "Regulations") adopted pursuant thereto by the Department of Environmental Conservation of the State of New York (collectively with the SEQR Act, "SEQRA"), by resolution adopted by the members of the Agency on December 18, 2019 (the "Original SEQR Resolution"), the Agency (A) concurred in the determination that the Town of Schoharie Planning Board (the "Planning Board") is the "lead agency" with respect to SEQRA and (B) acknowledged receipt of a negative declaration from the Planning Board issued on

October 15, 2019 (the "Original Negative Declaration"), in which the Planning Board determined that the Project would not have a significant adverse environmental impact on the environment, and therefore, that an environmental statement need not be prepared with respect to the Project; and

WHEREAS, by further resolution adopted by the members of the Agency on December 18, 2019 (the "Original Approving Resolution"), the Agency determined to grant the Financial Assistance and to enter into a straight-lease transaction with the Company;

WHEREAS, following the adoption of the Original Approving Resolution, the Project was unable to move forward due to the effects of the COVID-19 Pandemic; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to an amended application submitted to the Agency on April 7, 2022 (the "Amended Application"), a copy of which Amended Application is on file at the office of the Agency, the Original Project is now described as follows (the "Project"): (A) (1) the acquisition of an interest in a parcel of real estate containing approximately five (5) acres of land located at the corner of Rt. 7/30A and Zicha Road in the Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New York (the "Land"), (2) the construction on the Land of an approximately 40,000 square foot facility (the "Facility"), and (3) the acquisition and installation thereon and therein of machinery and equipment (the "Equipment") (the Land, the Facility and the Equipment being hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Project Facility"), all of the foregoing to constitute a commercial facility/trucking terminal to be owned and operated by the Company for the transport of recycled material and to be leased by the Company to commercial tenants for various commercial/light manufacturing/retail purposes, and any other directly and indirectly related activities; (B) the granting of certain "financial assistance" (within the meaning of Section 854(14) of the Act) with respect to the foregoing, including potential exemptions from certain sales and use taxes, real property taxes, real estate transfer taxes and mortgage recording taxes (collectively, the "Financial Assistance"); and (C) the lease (with an obligation to purchase) or sale of the Project Facility to the Company or such other person as may be designated by the Company and agreed upon by the Agency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authorization contained in the Public Hearing Resolution, the Chief Executive Officer of the Agency (A) caused notice of a public hearing of the Agency (the "Second Public Hearing") pursuant to Section 859-a of the Act, to hear all persons interested in the Project and the financial assistance being contemplated by the Agency with respect to the Project, to be mailed on April 12, 2022 to the chief executive officers of the county and of each city, town, village and school district in which the Project Facility is to be located, (B) caused notice of the Public Hearing to be posted on April 13, 2022 on a public bulletin board located in the Town of Schoharie Town Hall located at 300 Main Street in the Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New York and on the Agency's website on April 12, 2022; (C) caused notice of the Public Hearing to be published on April 14, 2022 in the Times-Journal, a newspaper of general circulation available to the residents of Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New York, (D) conducted the Public Hearing on April 25, 2022 at 6:30 o'clock p.m., local time in the Town Board Chambers of the Town Hall of the Town of Schoharie located at 300 Main Street in the Town of Schoharie, Schoharie County, New and (E) prepared a report of the Public Hearing (the "Public Hearing Report") fairly summarizing the views presented at such Public Hearing and caused copies of said Public Hearing Report to be made available to the members of the Agency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to SEQRA, the Agency has been informed that (A) the Town of Schoharie Planning Board (the "Planning Board") was designated to act as the "lead agency" with respect to the Project and (B) on March 1, 2022 the Planning Board determined that that the Project is a "unlisted action" which will not have a "significant effect on the environment" and, therefore, that an "environmental impact statement" is not required to be prepared with respect to the Project and issued a negative declaration with respect thereto (the "Second Negative Declaration"); and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MEMBERS OF SCHOHARIE COUNTY INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY, AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. (A) The Agency has received copies of, and has reviewed, the Application, the Amended Application, an environmental assessment form prepared by the Company, the Original Negative Declaration, and the Second Negative Declaration (collectively, the "Reviewed Documents") and, based upon said Reviewed Documents, the Agency hereby consents to the designation of the Planning Board as "lead agency" with respect to the Project (as such quoted term is defined in SEQRA).
 - (B) The Agency hereby determines that the Agency has no information to suggest that the Planning Board was incorrect in determining that the Project will not have a "significant effect on the environment" pursuant to SEQRA (as such quoted phrase is used in SEQRA).

<u>Section 2</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately.

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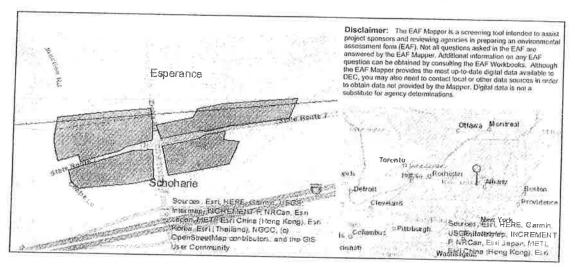
